

The Wynnedale Town Council meeting convened at 7 p.m. Jan. 12, 2021. All members were present.

This was the first Zoom meeting of the council, arranged by councillor Ann Hildner. Several members of the community also joined the meeting via Zoom.

Clerk-Treasurer Jarnell Burks-Craig gave both the November and December treasurer's report, and the year-end report.

As of Nov. 10, 2020, the town had \$1,143.66 in its bank account.

After expenses and deposits, the town had \$3,385.84 in that account as of Dec. 31.

In the town's Money Market Account, the balance was \$102,535.86 as of Nov. 10, 2020.

At year's end, with additional deposits from the town's share of various taxes, the amount had grown to \$110,935.59.

The town's total income, not counting expenses, from various state and local tax sources for 2020 was \$48,677.98.

Other Business:

1) Town maintenance: The council voted unanimously to continue contracts for snow removal and mowing of public areas — the esplanade, bird sanctuary and Sleepy Hollow — with Wynnedale resident Josh Darring of 4275 Knollton Road.

In 2021, Darring will plow snowfall of 2 to 4 inches for \$300, and snowfall of 4.5 to 8 inches for \$600.

His contract for mowing the public areas is \$5,565.

Burks-Craig said both amounts are lower than was spent in 2020.

2) Lighting: Burks-Craig said she is talking with Indianapolis city officials about the possibility of Wynnedale participating in a city program by Mayor Joe Hogsett to improve neighborhood lighting. The council has identified areas in the northern section of Wynnedale in need of additional street lights. Home owners in those areas are on board with installing additional lighting.

3) Derelict property on Wilshire Road: Talks continued about the need to do something to address the problems at 2125 Wilshire with the now unoccupied home and the partial shell of what was to be a new home. The property remains part of a lawsuit between developers. Hawickhorst asked about the possibility of Wynnedale getting legal advice, or even acquiring the property. Burks-Craig offered to talk to a recently-retired real estate attorney she knows.

4) The next meeting will be held on Feb. 9, 2021, again by Zoom. Ann Hildner will again post the invitation to the meeting.

The meeting adjourned about 7:45 p.m.
